

On Las Vegas' west side, just a 15-minute drive out W. Charleston Blvd (Highway 159) is Red Rock Canyon—part of the BLM-administered Red Rock National Conservation Area. There's a super-scenic 13-mile loop drive through the canyon. During your drive, you will likely see wild burros trotting confidently across the road ahead.

Although it's a bit distant, located on Valley View Blvd. on the city's southwest side, the Springs Preserve is considered to be the best non-gaming attraction in Las Vegas. This strikingly modern \$250 million cultural complex encompasses museums, interactive galleries, demonstration gardens, and teaching labs that focus on nature and history of the Las Vegas Valley as well as exploring the latest concepts of sustainable development in a desert environment. Time your visit to enjoy lunch at the classy, eco-friendly Springs Café by Wolfgang Puck.



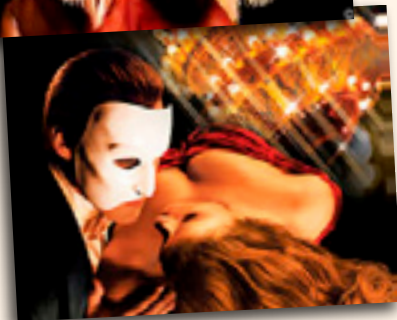
